Queensland—Mrs Stephanie Munday-Lake

AASN Secretariat

The Anglican Schools Office has continued to serve as the AASN Secretariat, managing the membership database, Management Committee meetings, procedures, website development and maintenance and financial accounts. It has coordinated, together with the host school, St Margaret's Anglican Girls' School, the 2003 Annual Conference.

Special recognition is given to Mrs Roseann Whyte, Executive Assistant of the Anglican Schools Office for the excellent administrative support provided specifically to the Management Committee and generally to the Network.

New Schools

Mrs Sue Hornum was appointed

Foundation Principal of St Andrew's Anglican College on the Sunshine Coast. The College commenced operation, with students from P-7, exceeding the expected enrolment target by 30%.

The Mary McConnel School, a special education facility, was opened this year as part of the joint Anglican/Uniting Church schools in Queensland. Mrs Jeanine Gallagher was appointed as Foundation Head of School.

Anglican Schools Office

Mr Gilbert Case resigned from his position at the Anglican Schools Office in May after many years of service to Anglican Schools, the last two as Executive Director of the Anglican Schools Office.

Assistant Directors, Stephanie Munday-Lake and Reg Kernke have taken responsibility for

the leadership and management of the Office and a variety of other Commission duties. Mr John Lindsay, Chair of the Commission, has been appointed as Interim Executive Director for the remainder of 2003.

Western Australia—The Reverend Peter Laurence

The Western Australia Anglican Schools Association

History was created earlier this year for WA Anglican schools. Several years' work came to fruition in May when Anglican schools from throughout the state agreed to form the Western Australian Anglican Schools Association (WAASA).

Following Archbishop Carnley's prompting, a task force was formed in 2001 to consider a means to recognise the interdependent relationship between Anglican schools in Western Australia.

A number of principles which lie at the heart of the Association were agreed to by Anglican Schools, both the longer established and autonomous and the younger schools of the Anglican Schools Commission.

These include the affirmation of Anglican heritage and of interdependence. The Association identified a number of educational issues common to all schools, including the recognition of the importance of Schools in the contemporary context of the Church's mission to young people and families.

WAASA also recognizes the benefits of sharing ideas, values and the development of views as well as the raising of a common voice on issues affecting education. The Association will play an important role in Western Australia by providing a platform on which to build and maintain relationships between all Anglican schools throughout

the State and in supporting the development of new Anglican schools.

New Schools

The newest WA Anglican school opened this year in Busselton, the gateway to the Margaret River region. Georgiana Molloy Anglican School opened with 130 students in Kindergarten to Year 6, growing to a current enrolment of 180. Next year it will open a Middle School, offering classes in Years 7 and 8.

The Anglican Schools Commission has plans to open a school in Broome, which will be the first Anglican school in the Diocese of North West Australia. In the coming years, schools will also be developed in the growing northern and southern corridors of Perth and the Swan Valley.

Tasmania—Mr Bruce Fairfax

The three Anglican Schools in Tasmania have maintained the status quo with enrolments holding. Stephen Norris was appointed as Principal of Launceston Grammar at the start of 2003.

There are no plans at this stage for the establishment of new Anglican schools in Tasmania.

Victoria – Mr Michael Urwin

In the first half of 2003 we welcomed two new Heads to the Anglican Network in Victoria: Tim Argall to Mentone Grammar School and Christine Jenkins to Korowa Anglican Girls School. These two appointments followed the retirements of Neville Clarke and Ros Otzens, both of whom gave outstanding service to their respective schools.

New Anglican Schools Task Group

This has been established by Archbishop Peter Watson and is chaired by Bishop Stephen Hale. It focuses on the role of the Diocese in assisting in the establishment of new Anglican schools and the guidelines for parish/school faith

communities. A new school, Penman College, is to be established at Rowville.

The Anglican Schools Committee

This Committee has considered protocols to be followed when new schools are being considered. Archbishop Watson has indicated that all existing Anglican schools will be informed of any potential new schools and that any proposed school will be required to conduct an impact study of prospective enrolments to indicate any potential impact on the enrolments of existing schools. The committee is also considering the role of Anglican schools in the Diocese.

Anglican Heads continue to enjoy strong collegiality. They meet formally with the Archbishop one per annum. At this year's meeting, the Archbishop shared a discussion paper with Heads: *Power and Trust in the Church*, which focuses on harassment issues.

There was also discussion of a proposed Education Centre at St Paul's Cathedral. The Dean further clarified this at a dinner for Anglican Heads held at Trinity College, University of Melbourne.

Anglican schools continue to support the Chaplains' Bursary Training Fund. There are three candidates this year.

New South Wales—Mr Malcolm Powys

There has continued to be a growth in enrolments in the independent sector in New South Wales, largely at the expense of the government system. The Sydney Anglican Schools Corporation has been active in establishing new schools in the Diocese and these low fee schools account for most of the growth in the sector. The State Government has been concerned at this trend and one of the recommendations of the Grimshaw Report is to make the establishment of new schools more difficult in the future. Education funding is a key political issue and there is much misinformation in the public debate about independent schools.

A grass roots movement called *Independent Schools in the Community*, has been formed under the auspices of the

AISNSW to address this concern.

Anglican Heads in New South Wales enjoy a positive collegiality, which is reinforced by the annual meeting of Heads in the Sydney Diocese with Archbishop Peter Jensen.

South Australia—Mr Stephen Matthew

In what was a tight educational market in South Australia, the Anglican Schools are holding their own well in terms of enrolments.

Last year the Anglican Schools Commission resolved that its constitution, and indeed its mission, needed to be reviewed. After much deliberation, it was agreed that in its past form, it had outlived its usefulness and the position of Executive Director was abolished. The Heads of Anglican Schools now meet as a Forum and rotate the Chair. Our recent discussions have included RAVE curriculum, models of Chaplaincy, and Child Protection. The South Australian Schools Commission is also reviewing its constitution and its role in advancing new schools.

A recent development of significance is the Diocesan appointment of Peter Casson as Educational Liaison Officer.

His role is to support new school proposals and to assist the Archbishop in matters associated with child protection as well as many others. The proposed new school, Raynor College, in the north-west suburbs is planned to open in 2004 at the earliest. Another school in Port Augusta is also under consideration.

The Heads met earlier this year with Archbishop Ian George where discussions included the relationships and partnerships between parishes and schools.

Two new Heads have been announced recently. Christopher Prance will take over the reins at St Peter's Woodlands Grammar School and Helen Trebilcock returns to Adelaide to lead Walford from Term 2, 2004.

Who can be a member of AASN?

Given the diversity of Anglican Schools in Australia, with widely varying levels of formal relationship to the General Synod or Diocesan authority, the following general guidelines are used to establish whether a School is Anglican:

An Anglican School is one that has an Anglican foundation historically, or which claims an Anglican heritage and is in communion with the Anglican Church of Australia or is capable of being in communion with the Anglican Church of Australia.

The Economics of Vision: Governing, Leading and Living the Values-Centred School

Queensland turned on its famous sunshine and hospitality for the 12th Annual AASN National Conference held at St Margaret's Anglican Girls School over the weekend 1 to 3 August 2003.

More than 200 delegates were welcomed by Mrs Vicki Waters, Principal of St Margaret's Anglican Girls School for a weekend of challenging and rewarding discussion and debate.

The Most Reverend Dr Phillip Aspinall, Archbishop of Brisbane set the scene for discussion and debate with his Keynote Address entitled *The Commerce of Faith*. This Address was followed by one which looked at the complimentary but diverse perspectives of Values and Economics involved in providing Anglican schooling.

The Right Reverend Dr Philip Freier, Bishop of the Northern Territory continued the challenge with his address entitled: *The Values of Christian Education in Australia's Future*.
